#### Introduction

This plan sets out the program of activities for Southern Biosecurity Group (SBG) for the 2026–2027 financial year.

Activities identified in this plan are aimed at achieving strategic priorities set out in SBG's Strategic Plan (2025-2030), the Biosecurity Management Strategy for the Ravensthorpe Shire with responses to the annual survey forwarded to landholders factored into the plan.

#### **About us**

Southern Biosecurity Group is a subcommittee of the Ravensthorpe Agricultural Initiative Network (RAIN). SBG mandate is to coordinate control of declared pest species in the Shire of Ravensthorpe. We first began operating in 2002 as the Ravensthorpe Declared Species Group. At that time, our role involved coordinating wild dog control in the shire. We achieve good control of wild dog numbers through a range of activities including dispersing of 1080 baits, trapping and shooting. We believe declared pests can be better managed by a coordinated approach between community, industry and government.

This belief has led to us becoming a Recognised Biosecurity Group through the Biosecurity and Agricultural Management Act 2007 (BAM Act) which is currently in a review stage. This means that landholder funds raised through the Declared Pest Rate are matched dollar for dollar by the State Government enabling us to provide coordinated and targeted control of declared pests and plants within the shire. The area of operation is shown below.

#### Our Vision and purpose:

That the Southern Biosecurity Group is proactive in encouraging all stakeholders to adopt sound biosecurity practices.

Minimize the environmental, economic and social impacts of animal pests and weeds on agricultural industry, landscapes and biodiversity values within the Ravensthorpe Shire.

We will achieve this through coordinating a community-based approach to the management of animal pests and weeds.

## Declared Pest Rate (DPR) for the Southern Biosecurity Group area of operation:

Funds raised by the DPR and the State Government co-contribution will support the commercial, environmental and social values of the Shire of Ravensthorpe community through:

- Improved animal welfare by preventing wild dog attacks on livestock and native animals;
- Add to land values by improving the viability of current and new livestock enterprises;
- Strengthen economic return when selling or leasing land suitable for the running of livestock;
- Safety of locals and tourists walking, sightseeing and horse riding in bushland areas;
- Reduce fox numbers by uptake of baits via wild dog baiting programs;
- Impact on fox and rabbit numbers as part of a collaborative control program, including coordination of an annual shoot and release of RHDV rabbit virus and warren destruction;
- Provision of equipment to trap pests impacting on urban areas;
- Support endangered species conservation, (e.g. numbats and mallee fowl); and

 Prevent the establishment of wild dog populations within national parks, reserves and urban residential areas.

The rate for the 2026/27 financial year will increase with 4.9% and merging of 4 ha ranges into 2 ranges, with the following rates to be applied to urban farming or urban residential or urban vacant or urban miscellaneous, on the non-rural valuation roll and rural freehold on the rural valuation roll maintained under the Valuation of Land Act 1978.

#### Disbursement Financial Year 26/27:

We are basing this amount on the forecasted rate revenue modeling. For 2026/27, we have been advised by Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development it is estimated that \$108,563 (excluding GST) will be raised through the determination of rates in the Southern Biosecurity Group's prescribed area. The total amount raised is matched by State Government funding. This means it is forecasted that an amount of \$217,126 will be available to SBG for the 2026/27 year. The Declared Pest Rate current hectare range will combine ha ranges 0-50 and 50-200 to create range 0-200 ha as well as combining 200-500 and 500-1000 to create 200-1000 and the rate will increase by 4.9% in 2026/27.

These changes have been proposed to align with increasing operational costs and to ensure that the rate collected is sufficient to cover the amount required for revenue collection by Revenue WA.

Please note, the figure raised through the determination may be lower than the estimated figure and may vary due to several factors, including but not limited to, property subdivisions, changes in unimproved land values, pensioner postponements under the BAM Act or any other applicable exemptions, as determined on a case-by-case basis by the Commissioner of Revenue WA.
